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Congressional Briefing: OMB's Backdoor War on Regulation

CPR Scholars to Detail Administration's Attack on Environmental, Health and Safety Regulations

Many of the Bush Administration's efforts to roll back environmental, health and safety regulations are centered not in the departments with the statutory obligation to regulate such areas, but rather with the Office of Management and Budget, whose Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA) wields extraordinary control over the regulatory process. "OMB's Backdoor War on Regulation" is the subject of a 90-minute briefing for Members of Congress and staff, scheduled for Friday, March 14 at 9 a.m. in Dirksen 342. Breakfast will be served.

Speakers will focus on OMB's role in rolling back regulation; debunk the technical tricks OIRA uses to devalue health, safety, and environmental protections; and analyze OMB's new proposed guidelines for cost-benefit analysis and the likelihood that they will hasten the federal retreat from environmental, worker safety, and consumer regulation.
